I would still be teaching children, but getting to work much more closely with them. I am motivated by the amount of satisfaction I can gain from the work that I do. THIS is the part of me that has followed me through four years within the KCR/AmeriCorps Program.

I entered into this adventure looking for possible direction involving a career choice. I will exit the program for a final time knowing that I will be happiest if my career choice can still offer me a "life in

service". I now know that this is where my own happiness resides, in providing for others. I smile bigger and sleep better at the end of a day when I KNOW I have helped improve the life of another.
